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Bills Needing Action This Week

SSB 5082 Abolish Advisory Votes: AGAIN! This important bill would rid ballots of Advisory votes, which are required to appear first on the ballot, are confusing, costly, and do NOT change legislation already passed. The bill does offer simple, easy to understand ways to present fiscal information to voters on ballot measures that would impact state programs.

Please email your Senator again, and ask for a YES when this bill, a vote, comes to the floor for a vote.

HB 1229 Secure Automatic Voter Registration: Using identifying documents as a prompt, Automatic Voter Registration registers voters and updates existing voter registrations at Dept. of Licensing.

Bills We Support

HB 1048 /SB 5047 Enhanced Washington Voting Rights Act

This bill amends sections of the Washington Voting Rights Act to clarify what constitutes a violation of the act. It seeks to protect members of classes who do not have an equal opportunity to elect candidates of their choice through methods that have created vote dilution

or polarized voting. (*House State Gov't & Tribal Relations: public hearing 1/13/23. Executive session 1/20/23, Substitute bill passed out of committee; 1/24/23 Referred to Rules 2 Review*)

HB 1158 / SB 5082 Abolish Advisory Votes

Advisory votes are questions that appear on the ballot regarding state tax revenue increases for expenditures that have already been passed by the legislature. By having voters mark "repealed" or "maintained", the wording suggests that they are a binding referendum. However, the results have no impact, and therefore are inconsistent with League principles. Required to be first on the ballot, they confuse and discourage voters. In addition, they add significantly to the costs of elections. (*House State Gov't & Tribal Relations: 1/18 Exec session scheduled, no action taken.*)

HB 1174 Improving Access and Removing Barriers to Jail-Based Voting

Provides access to registration and voting to those incarcerated in county jails while awaiting trial. (*House State Gov't & Tribal Relations: public hearing 1/13, Exec. Session 1/31, SHB passed w/ do pass recommendation, 2/2 referred to Appropriations*)

HB 1229/SB 5112 Secure Automatic Voter Registration Using identifying documents as a prompt, Automatic Voter Registration registers voters and updates existing voter registrations at Dept. of Licensing. Transaction time is shorter, less costly, and registers more eligible voters. Accurate and updated registration reduces undeliverable election mail, provisional ballots, and same-day registration. Confirmation of the registration is mailed to the voter by the appropriate election agency, and the recipient then has the option to decline the registration. This automatic registration process is used successfully in Alaska, Colorado, Oregon, Delaware, and Massachusetts, and is deemed safe, secure, and efficient from beginning to end. (*In HOUSE State Gov. & Tribal Relations, Public hearing 2/7*)

HB 1241 Addressing Harassment

This bill modifies crimes of harassment and cyber harassment to cover conduct that is lewd or threatens bodily injury, property damage, confinement, or other malicious threats. Increases penalty for harassment of an election official to a class C felony. Allows election officials who are harassed to apply for the address confidentiality program. (*1/11 First reading; referred to House Committee on Community Safety, Justice, & Reentry. 1/17 Public hearing. 1/26 Exec action; 1st substitute bill be substituted, do pass. 1/27 Referred to Rules 2 Review.*)

HB 1443/SB 5208 Updating the online voter registration process by allowing voter applicants to provide the last four digits of social security number for authentication. (*House State Gov't & Tribal Relations public hearing 1/27, Exec. Session 2/1 no action, Exec. Session 2/7.*)

HB 1541/SB 5616 Establishing the Nothing About Us Without Us Act (Lived Experience)

provides the means for including underrepresented populations in policy making discussions where their lived experience can impact decisions made that would affect their group. A bill last

year provided stipends enabling certain populations ability to participate; this bill gives them access. (*House SG & TR public hearing 2/3, 2/10 Exec. session*)

HB 1567 Commissioning a study on Conservation District election costs This bill is in response to concerns expressed last session from conservation districts about the cost burden of moving their elections to the general ballot. The League published the results of our study on their election methods and procedures in May 2011 in this [report](#). Our position is these elections should be held in regularly scheduled elections to increase public engagement and voter participation. (*House SG & TR public hearing 2/7, scheduled for exec session 2/10*)

HB 1592/Ranked Choice Voting for Presidential Primaries.

This bill would eliminate “wasted” primary votes and produce choices with broad voter support for delegates representing their party’s candidates at their National Convention, where presidential candidates are selected. If one or two candidates are running, the current election method is used (Republican side of the ballot in 2020). If there are more than two candidates, Ranked Choice Voting is used to rank up to five candidates. (Democrat primary ballot in 2020). Post-election, counties send certified election data to the SoS for tabulation and publishing of the statewide election results. SoS office is also charged with developing public educational materials for the public and training for county auditors. (*House: 1/25 in State Gov’t & Tribal Relations*)

SSB 5047/HB 1048 Enhanced Washington Voting Rights Act

This bill amends sections of the Washington Voting Rights Act to clarify what constitutes a violation of the act. It seeks to protect members of classes who do not have an equal opportunity to elect candidates of their choice through methods that have created vote dilution or polarized voting. (*Senate State Gov’t & Elections public hearing 1/20, Exec. session 1/27, passed out of committee, referred to Rules Comm. 2nd Rdg. 1/30*)

SSB 5082/ HB 1158 Abolish Advisory Votes Advisory votes are questions that appear on the ballot regarding state expenditures that have already been passed by the legislature. By having voters mark "repealed" or “maintained”, the wording suggests that they are a binding referendum. However, the results have no impact, and therefore are inconsistent with League principles. Required to be first on the ballot, they confuse and discourage voters. In addition, they add significantly to the costs of elections. (*Senate Ways & Means: 1/23 Exec action taken; 1/25 Passed to Rules Committee for second reading; placed on second reading. Action alert 1/29, urging Senators to support. On the Senate Floor calendar.*)

SSB 5112/HB 1229 Secure Automatic Voter Registration.

Using identifying documents as a prompt, Automatic Voter Registration registers voters and updates existing voter registrations at Dept. of Licensing. Transaction time is shorter, less costly, and registers more voters. Accurate and updated registration reduces undeliverable election mail, provisional ballots, and same-day registration. Confirmation of the registration is mailed to the voter by the appropriate election agency, and the recipient then has the option to decline

the registration. This automatic registration process is used successfully in Alaska, Colorado, Oregon, Delaware, and Massachusetts, and is deemed safe, secure, and efficient from beginning to end. (*Senate State Gov't & Elections public hearing 1/10/23, Exec. session 1/13/23, passed unanimously, moved to Transportation committee, public hearing 1/30/23, 2/2 Exec. Session to Rules Comm. do pass recommendation, SENATE Transportation Committee; with do pass recommendation, 2/2 referred to Ways & Means*)

SSB 5208/HB 1443 Updating the online voter registration process by allowing voter applicants to provide the last four digits of social security number for authentication. (*Senate State Gov't & Elections public hearing 1/17/23, Exec. Session 1/20/23 passed out of committee, 1/27 placed on 2nd Review by Rules Comm. On Senate Floor Calendar, 2/1 Passed Senate*) 29-18-0-2)

SB 5616/HB 1541 Establishing the Nothing About Us Without Us Act (Lived Experience) provides the means for including underrepresented populations in policy making discussions where their lived experience can impact decisions made that would affect their group. A bill last year provided stipends enabling certain populations ability to participate; this bill gives them access. (*Senate: 1/3 first rdg., 2/7 public hearing*)

HB 1220/SB 5209 Universal Civic Voting (*Senate State Gov't & Elections public hearing 1/31, Exec. Session 2/7, 2/10*)

HB 1475 Increasing access to elections by allowing ballot submission via online portal for certain populations. (*HOUSE SG & TR public hearing 1/25*)

SB 5153 Concerning information of underage applicants for drivers license/registration to vote. (*Senate State Gov't & Elections public hearing 1/17, Exec. Session 1/20, passed out of committee, 1/23 to Rules for 2nd rdg.*)

SSB 5182 Concerning candidate filing deadlines and procedures (*Senate State Gov't & Elections public hearing 1/17, Exec. Session 1/20, passed out of committee, 1/23 passed to Rules for 2nd rdg.*)
