

Weekly Legislative Update: Health Care

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Several important bills did not make it to the cutoff, and we will be eliminating them from our Grid and our weekly pages. We will now mostly be signing in either PRO or CON on most bills we follow as they are scheduled for public hearings. The legislature is also now discussing what effect each bill will have on the budget and what their priorities will be. As of this writing, here is where things are:

As always, the most effective influence we can have really is for many voices speaking for themselves rather than many voices speaking for the League. Remember to speak for yourself. The Issue Chairs will speak for the League. Learn how to participate HERE

The Dental Therapy issue is one we have been following for a long time. It has made good progress in the House this session, however now it is headed for the Senate. Please contact Senator Cleveland and ask her to schedule a public hearing.

<u>HB 1678</u> Establishing and authorizing the profession of dental therapy. This bill will define the profession of dental therapy and how it will fit within the dental team but allows it only to exist within federally qualified health centers only. This is a bill long supported by the League as it promises to improve access to dental care for underserved pockets of the broader community. This bill needs a hearing.

Health Care Staffing Bills – Update

SB 5236 Concerning hospital staffing standards. Sponsored by Sen. Robinson and fourteen others. Relating to improving nurse and health care worker safety and patient care by establishing minimum staffing standards in hospitals, requiring hospital staffing committees to develop staffing plans, addressing mandatory overtime and meal and rest breaks, and providing for enforcement. It has passed many hurdles and is scheduled for a public hearing 3/15/23 at 8am.

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SB 5278 Implementing audit recommendations to reduce barriers to home care aide certification. Sponsored by Sen. L. Wilson and eight others. Requires the departments of Health and Social and Health Services to address delays between training and testing, the lack of test sites, and performance and contract management processes, and submitting a report to the Governor and Legislature no later than June 30, 2024. 2nd substitute Passed unanimously on the floor 3/1/23. Scheduled for a public hearing in the House Post-Secondary Ed. 3/14/23 at 1:30 pm.

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SB 5454 Concerning industrial insurance coverage for posttraumatic stress disorders affecting registered nurses. Sponsored by Sen. Cleveland and eleven others. Provides industrial insurance coverage for posttraumatic stress disorders affecting registered nurses. 2nd substitute Passed and scheduled for a public hearing in the House Labor & Workplace Standards 3/17/23.

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<u>HB 1593</u> Concerning industrial insurance coverage for posttraumatic stress disorders affecting registered nurses. Sponsored by Rep. Macri and eleven others. This is a companion bill to SB 5454, see description above. **Executive Action taken 2/24/23 passed to Rules.**

SB 5582 Reducing barriers and expanding educational opportunities to increase the supply of nurses in Washington. Sponsored by Sen. Holy and twenty others. Requires the state board for community and technical colleges to develop a plan to increase credential opportunities in nursing. Creates nursing education opportunities at community and technical colleges and within the Department of Veterans Affairs. Modifies program approval and training requirements under the Nursing Care Quality Assurance Commission. Will create the High School Student Certified Nursing Assistant Pilot Program. 2nd Substitute passed and was referred to Post-Secondary Education Committee in the House.

Continue to Act on Reproductive Freedom and Care

We have had many wins in reproductive healthcare so far this session. One of the losers was also one of the most critical.

SB 5242 Prohibits cost sharing for abortion. Sponsored by Senator Cleveland and sixteen

others. Companion bill to HB 1115 (description for this bill is provided below). Passed on 2/28/23 by 10 votes and had first reading and is referred to the house where it has a public hearing 3/17/23 at 8am in the House Health and Wellness Committee.

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HB 1115 Cost Sharing for Abortions. Sponsored by Representative Bateman and seventeen others. This bill seeks to end the practice of copays and coinsurance preventing some women from obtaining abortion care. It was heard and referred to the Healthcare & Wellness Committee on 1/9/23.

SB 5351 Addressing the collection, sharing, and selling of consumer health data. Companion bill to HB 1155 described below. Referred to Law & Justice on 1/12/23.

HB 1155 Addressing the collection, sharing, and selling of consumer health data. Establishes consumer rights regarding health data; defines obligations of regulated entities that collect, process, share, and sell consumer health data. Prohibits selling consumer health data without a valid authorization. Prohibits implementing a geofence to track or collect data from consumers who enter certain health care entities. 1st substitute passed and is now IN THE Senate with a public hearing 3/14/23 at 10:30am in Senate Law & Justice.

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SB 5400 Concerning actions by health professions' disciplining authorities against license holders and applicants. This bill seeks to protect healthcare license holders or applicants from having action taken against them for providing gender affirming or reproductive healthcare. Companion bill to HB 1340 described below. Sponsored by Senator Salomon and sixteen others. First reading was 1/16/23,

HB 1340 Concerning actions by health professionals disciplining authorities against applicants and license holders. Sponsored by Rep. Riccelli and twenty-four others. Passed unanimously 2/28/23, had public hearing on 3/9/12 at 10:30.

SB 5489 Concerning access to reproductive health care services and gender affirming treatment in Washington state. Sponsored by Senator Trudeau and Wellman and thirteen others. This bill provides legal protection for individuals who provide or receive protected health care services from lawsuits or criminal cases commenced in other states. This is a companion bill to HB 1469 described below. This bill has been referred to the Health & Longterm Care Committee. It was heard in committee in Senate Law & Justice 1/24/23; It was then passed on 1/27/23 to Rules for a second reading.

<u>HB 1469</u> Concerning access to reproductive services and gender affirming treatment in Washington state. Sponsored by Representatives Hansen and Thai and twenty-five others. This is a companion bill to SB 5489 described above. First substitute passed 2/28/23, referred to Senate Law & Justice 3/2/23, has a public hearing 3/16/23 at 8am.

Senate Bills

<u>SB 5036</u> Concerning telemedicine. This is a companion bill to HB 1027 (described below). Sponsored by Senator Muzzall. This bill has passed the narrowly in the House Healthcare & Wellness committee as of this writing.

SB 5103 Concerning payment to acute care hospitals for difficult to discharge Medicaid patients. Patients in hospitals in small communities are waiting to be discharged to other placement such as a nursing home bed. This bill will protect these hospitals which smaller and rural communities cannot afford to lose. Sponsored by Senator Muzzall. There was a comprehensive work session, and the bill had a public hearing in the Health and Long-Term Care Committee on 1/17/23. 2nd substitute passed 2/23/23 unanimously. It has been referred to House Health & Wellness.

SB 5179 Increasing access to the provisions of the Death with Dignity Act. This is a companion bill to HB 1281 described below (which was introduced in the house this past week and has been championed by Rep. Skylar Rude for many years.) This senate bill is sponsored by Senator Pederson and nineteen others. This bill has faced opposition principally due to religious beliefs. The League has supported this bill over many years. 1st substitute passed by only 8 votes 2/27/23. It had a 1st reading and public hearing. It passed narrowly in Executive session 3/10/23.

<u>SB 5499</u> Concerning the multistate nursing licensure compact. A bill sponsored by Senator Mullet and six others would seek changes in existing law to allow Washington state to cooperate with other states so that Registered Nurses with a Washington license or a nurse from another state with agreed to regulations might work in another state and vice versa.

Compacts exists in 29 other states and make relocating for nurses and recruiting for hospitals more possible. 1st substitute passed 3/6/23 and is referred to Postsecondary Education & Workforce.

<u>SB 5519</u> Improving Health Care Consumer Affordability through the Health Care Cost Transparency board. Sponsored by Sen. Robinson and eleven others. This is a companion bill to HB 1508. It was heard and referred to Health & Long-Term Care 1/23/23.

SJM 8006 Requesting that the Federal Government create a Universal Health Care Program. This bill sponsored by Senator Hasegawa, Cleveland, Billig, Kuderer, Lovelett, Nugyen, Shewmake, Stanford, Valdez, and Wilson, C. is a joint memorial to the Federal Government which requests the Government to create a single payor Universal Healthcare program and if it will not or cannot the Government should provide Washington State with the necessary waivers allowing the State to develop, define, and fund our own. It is a statement to Washington DC that we the people of Washington want Universal Healthcare funded by a single payor system separate from employment. It was referred to Healthcare & Wellness for a public hearing.

House Bills

HB 1027 Concerning telemedicine. Extending the Telemedicine time frame option (until 01/2017) in which real-time telemedicine using both audio and video technology may be used and has important consequences for the underserved, frail, and elderly especially in rural communities. Sponsored by Rep. Riccelli and eighteen others and has bipartisan support. This bill was moved to the committee on health and healthcare and heard, in Executive Session on 1/13/23 and received a Do Pass recommendation and referred to Rules where it was relieved of further consideration. The companion bill is moving successfully through the House.

HB 1222 Requiring coverage for hearing Instruments. This bill passed out of the house and is scheduled for executive session this week. Sponsored by Representative Orwall and sixteen others. 1st substitute passed 2/28/23, it has a public hearing on 3/14/23 at 8am.

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<u>HB 1281</u> Increasing access to the provisions of the Death with Dignity Act. Sponsored by Representative Rude and twenty-one others. It is on the floor calendar.

<u>HB 1508</u> Improving Health Care Consumer Affordability through the Health Care Cost Transparency Board. Sponsored by Representative Macri and thirteen others. This bill directs the Board to study consumer underinsurance, consider the role of profit as a driver of spending and directs the Board to study the role of non-profit tax breaks on spending as well as other important considerations. Referred to Senate Health & Long-Term Care.
