


- Minimum wage

Poverty rates In Washington have fallen





Median household incomes are increasing, but racial inequity high





WA gender wage gap now at 76.5%





Federal policies will exacerbate inequality





2017-19 budget

- McCleary funding relies on property tax increases in areas with soaring housing costs
- •Capital budget died in Senate
- •Gov's supplemental budget funds teacher salaries, increases K-12 and mental health, but relies on transfers
- •No major new revenue likely in 2018
